- 3 Xena, Yvonne and Zoe are having a luxury break at the Midshire Manor Hotel and Spa. Consider whether Xena, Yvonne and Zoe might succeed in any claims they may make against Midshire Manor Hotel and Spa in occupiers' liability.
 - (a) Xena goes for a sauna. She is electrocuted when she pours water over the sauna heater. The sauna has just been fitted by Superb Saunas, a firm of professional sauna fitters. However, it has not been wired correctly. [10]
 - (b) Yvonne needs to iron her dress but there is no iron in her room. She goes to a door marked 'Housekeeping Staff Only' and enters the room thinking it will be a good place to find an iron. The light only comes on when it detects an electronic staff identity badge. In the darkness Yvonne falls over a mop and bucket breaking her arm in the fall. [10]
 - (c) Zoe is taking a walk in the hotel gardens when she is attacked by a swan which the hotel keeps in the grounds for decorative reasons. The hotel is aware that the swan is aggressive and occasionally dangerous but has done nothing about it. Zoe suffers cuts and bruises. [10]
