- 11 To what extent was the Sino–Soviet split caused by disagreement over relations with the West? [30]
- 12 'Iran's aim of overthrowing Saddam Hussein was the main reason why the Iran–Iraq War lasted so long.' Assess this view. [30]

- 13 Assess the importance of propaganda to the rise to power of nationalist leaders in Africa. [30]
- 14 How influential were socialist ideas in determining the nature of African states after independence? [30]
- **15** How important were new forces in society to the social and economic power bases of newly independent states? [30]
- 16 'Nkrumah was a dynamic leader of the Pan-Africanist movement.' Assess this view. [30]

Depth Study 5: Southeast Asian History, 1945–1990s

- **19** How far did Thailand benefit from military rule in the period from 1945 to the 1990s? [30]
- 20 How far did economic development in Southeast Asia bring about improvement in living standards? [30]
