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Extracts for use with Section C.

Extract 1: From Dan Jones, *Crusaders*, published 2019.

Enrico Dandolo was a calculating and practical thinker. In his oath of office, he swore to serve the 'honour and profit' of Venice, and he kept his promise.

In October 1202, and with the crusade short of funds and manpower, Dandolo argued that it was right to plunder the city of Zara. At one time the city had owed tribute and obedience to Venice, but in 1180 they had rebelled. Now they were under the lordship of King Emeric of Hungary. 5

Innocent III had suspected Dandolo might do this and had specifically forbidden it. Some crusader leaders thought it wrong to attack a city under the protection of a Christian king. However, Dandolo continued to propose downright insubordination and defied Innocent's command. 10

As the Venetian fleet approached Zara, the townspeople took to the city walls and unfurled banners with crosses. They were reminding the Venetians and crusaders that they, too, were crusaders. Dandolo didn't care. He ignored the howls of protest from the crusaders and ordered an assault on the city.

Extract 2: From Donald E. Queller and Gerald W. Day, *Some Arguments in Defense of the Venetians on the Fourth Crusade*, published 1976.

Most historians of the Fourth Crusade make a number of anti-Venetian assumptions. The most prominent accusations are: 15

Firstly, that the Venetians were not enthusiastic about crusading. Secondly, Doge Dandolo compelled the crusaders to comply with his treacherous plans. Thirdly, the Venetians had trading interests with Alexandria that would be damaged if the crusade landed there. And lastly, that Venice was intent on securing for itself, a dominant trading role in the Byzantine Empire. 20

These assumptions seem plausible and even self-evident in the light of the eventual profit Venice gained from the conquest of Constantinople. However, the evidence to support these assumptions is weak. The Venetians were the victims of a series of mistakes, failures and accidents that began with the Treaty of Venice, and decided the fate of the Fourth Crusade. The Venetians were caught up in a chain of unforeseen events that threatened to overwhelm the crusade. It was actually the Venetians and their remarkable Doge Dandolo who consistently provided the leadership to rescue the Fourth Crusade. 25
